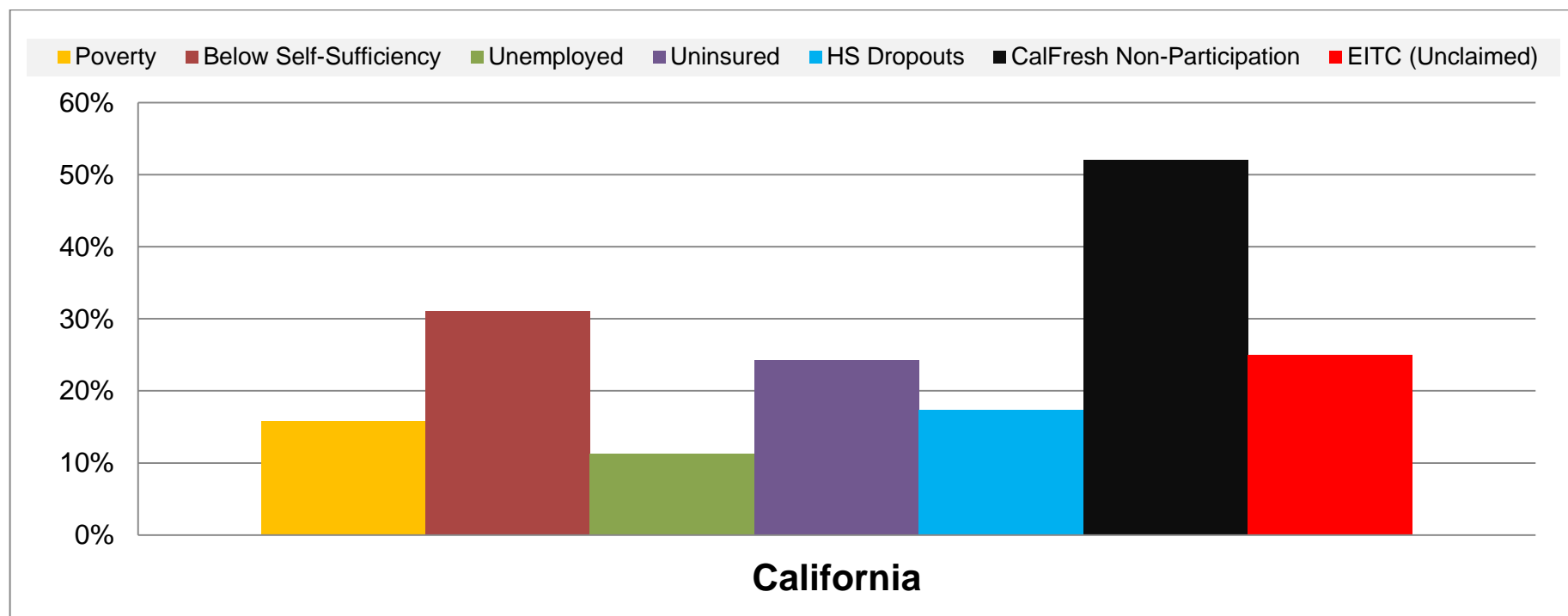
The tables below provide the following data for each county in California:

Total population:	Estimates of population by county and statewide for July 2009. (U.S. Census Bureau)
Living below the federal poverty line:	This statistic is defined as the number of people with income at or below 100% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines in 2009. (U.S. Census Bureau)
Cost of Living:	Number and percent of households below the self-sufficiency standard. The self-sufficiency standard is a county-by-county measure of the cost of living; households below this standard do not have sufficient income to cover basic expenses like childcare, transportation, healthcare, and food.
Unemployed:	The number and percent of people in California who were unemployed as of October 2011, out of the total Civilian Labor Force (N = 18.2 million, statewide). (California Employment Development Division)
NEW! Uninsured:	County-by-county estimates of the number of California residents without health insurance. NOTE: Some county data, due to small population size, was combined for the purposes of these counts.
Homelessness:	Point-in-time count of the number and percent of individuals in each county who were homeless (sheltered and unsheltered) on a given night, from the Assessment of Homelessness Annual Report (AHAR) to Congress 2010, published by HUD in 2011. NOTE: This data is not available for every county and some counties were combined for the purposes of these counts.
NEW! High School Dropout Rates:	Dropouts by grades 9 through 12 in the state of California for year of 2009-2010. The 4-year derived dropout rate is an estimate of the percent of students who would drop out in a four year period based on data collected for a single year.
Eligible for CalFresh but not participating:	2010 estimate of the number of individuals who are income eligible but not participating in CalFresh, calculated according to the formula below. (California Food Policy Advocates). Program Access Index is the participation rate as calculated by CFPA. $(\# \text{ of Income-Eligible Individuals}) \times (1 - \text{Program Access Index}^*) = \# \text{ of Income-Eligible Non-Participants}$ <p><i>NOTE: CalFresh participation presented differently from the last report. Previous report calculated non-participants based on total eligible in each county multiplied by average statewide non-participation rate of 52%. This report calculates non-participants according to county-specific participation rates. For each county, inverse of participation rate is multiplied by total eligibles.</i></p>

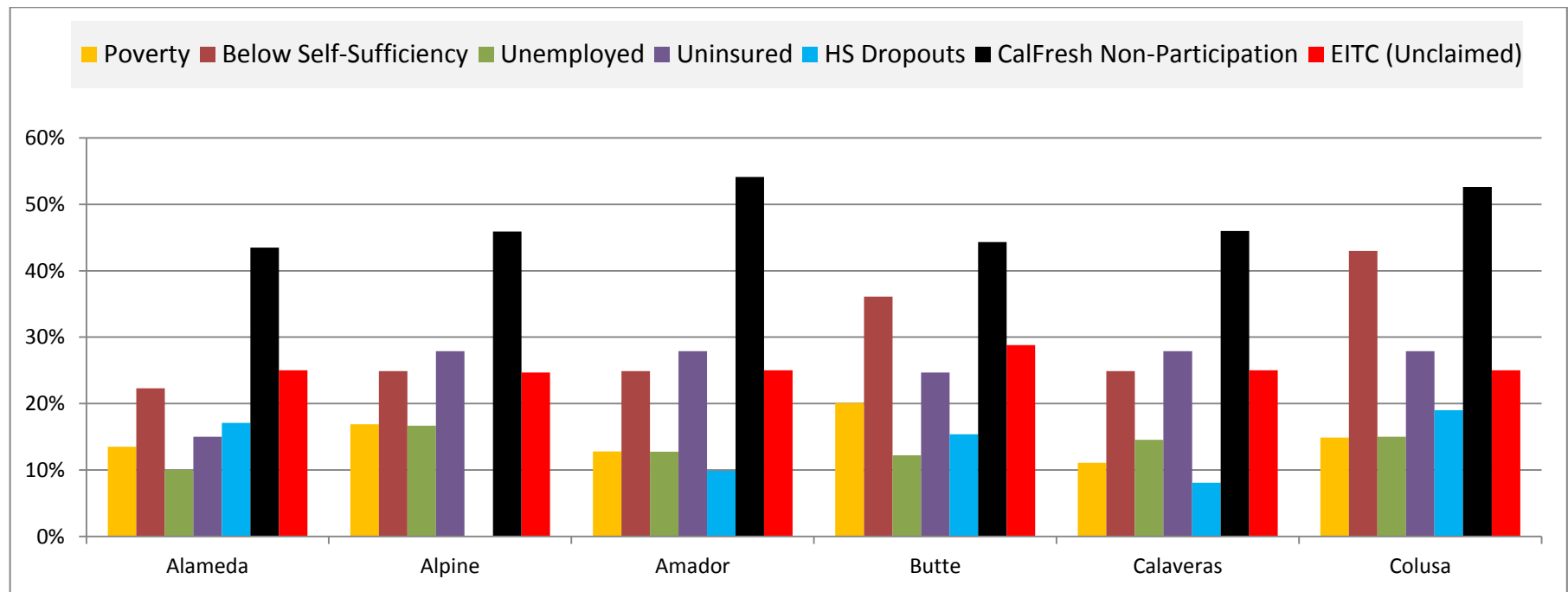

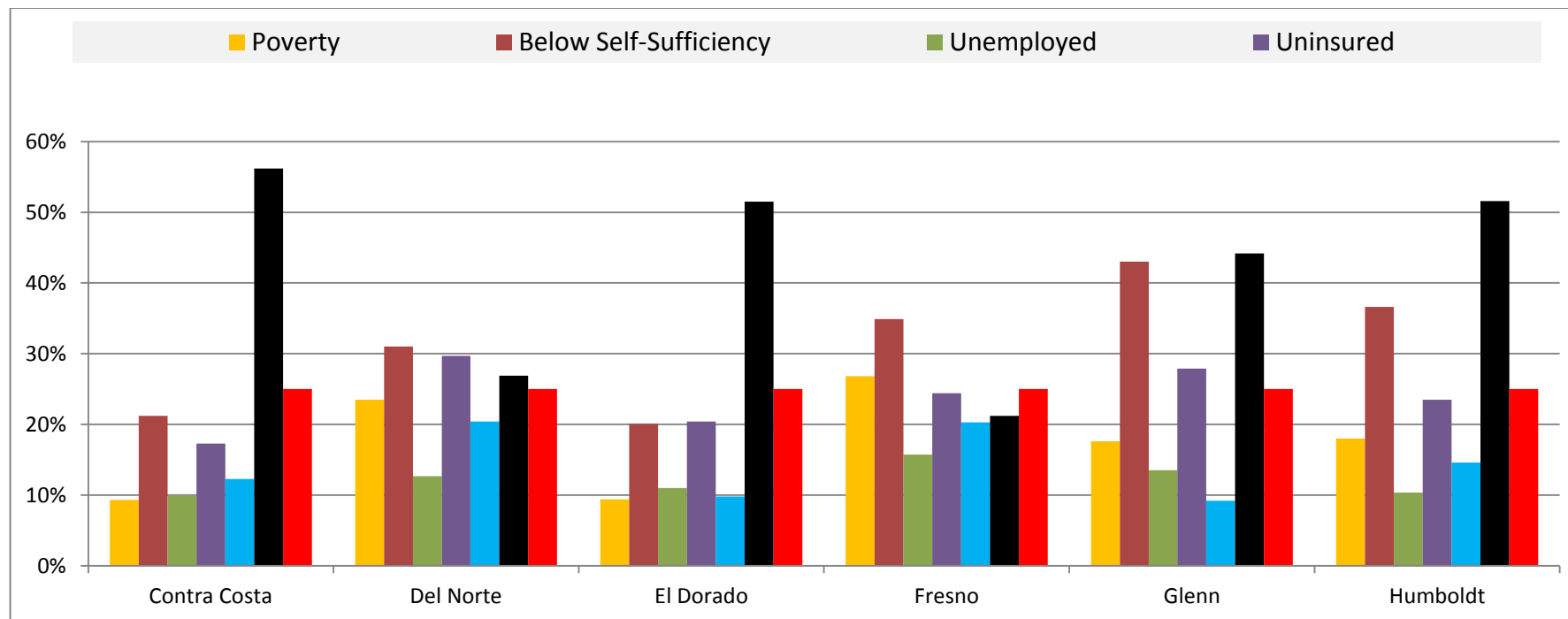


¹ The national figure for the high school dropout rate was obtained using the *status dropout rate* method, which represents the percentage of 16- through 24-year-olds who are not enrolled in school and have not earned a high school credential, whereas the dropout rate figure for California was calculated using the *derived rate formula*, which is an estimate of the percent of students who would drop out in a four-year period based on data collected for a single year.

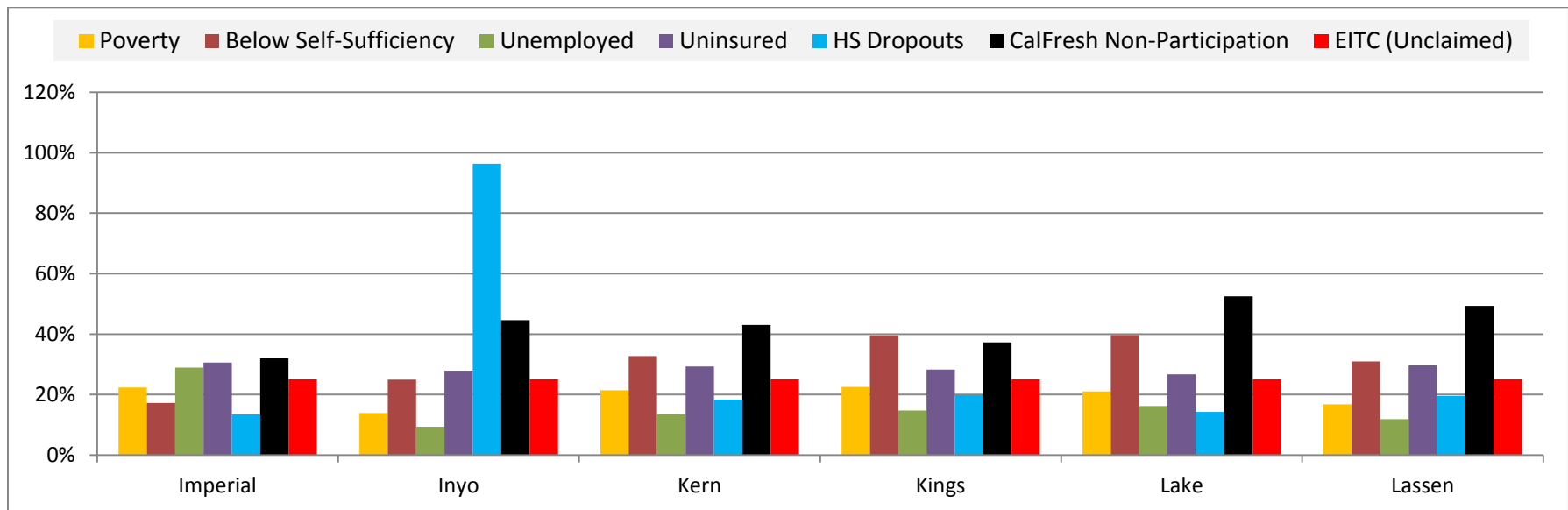
